




Incident profile over time:

- Almost all were preventable
- Most had no hunter education (safety) course or program
- Not wearing any type of hunter orange clothing
- Most due to lack of judgment or skill
- Most had over 10 years of hunting experience
- Not under the influence of alcohol
- If self-inflicted, handled firearm carelessly; grabbed trigger; firearm fell
- Distance of muzzle to wound mostly within 10 yards
- Incident occurred towards dusk; fatigue a factor

Significant for 2014

- 48% (12 incidents) reported incidents occurred in September
- 36% (9 incidents) were caused by swinging on game.
- Median age of shooters was 22, ranging in age from 7 to 61 years old
- Median age of victims was 34, ranging in age from 10 to 70 years old
- One (1) of the hunter education graduates in the 2014 incident data took the all-online course
- Number of alcohol or drug incidents was 3; median shooter age 34, ranging in age from 22 to 44 years old

Removing a loaded firearm from a vehicle	(69/M) Rifle	Yes	While at a residence, in preparation to go hunting, the victim was removing a cased, loaded gun from his truck. The rifle slid out of the case, striking the ground, causing the discharge. Witness heard the shot and found the victim next to the vehicle.
Removing a loaded firearm from a vehicle	(37/M) Rifle	Yes	In camp, the victim retrieved his backpack containing a loaded rifle from his ATV. The trigger caught on something with the bullet striking the victim in the chest. The victim stumbled into the cabin. Fellow hunters administered CRP and first aid without success.
Careless handling of a firearm	(14/M) Shotgun	Yes	Back in the hunting cabin, victim worked the action of the shotgun three times. He tossed the gun to the shooter who turned the muzzle towards the victim and pulled the trigger striking the victim in the chest.
Careless handling of a firearm	(44/M) Rifle	No	While back at the ranch house, victim's right hand unknowingly disengaged the safety when retrieving the loaded gun from the vehicle. Finger in the trigger guard caused the loaded firearm to discharge striking the hunter in the foot.
Ricochet	(49/M)	No	Shooter was target shooting at the hunting camp. Victim was standing 5 feet behind the shooter and felt pain from his right arm after a shot was fired; the result of a ricochet projectile.
Fall	(51/M) Rifle	No	While filling a feeder, victim fell from the elevated deer feeder. Victim landed on the loaded rifle causing it to discharge, striking him in the chest.

Careless handling of a firearm	(16/M) Handgun	No	Victim was on the phone in camp and while loading a pistol in hunting camp. Pistol fell and discharged, striking him the right bicep.
Careless handling of a firearm	(75/M) Handgun	No	Victim was picking up brass by the river. When observed and approached by a Deputy Sheriff. The victim placed the gun in his belt. The gun discharged when he placed his hands on the tailgate of his truck, striking him in the calf. Violation included target practice on Federal property
Careless handling of a firearm	(20/M) Handgun	No	At hunting camp, the hunting party was target shooting. Victim attempted to spin the revolver with his hand causing it to discharge striking the victim in the thigh.
